

## **70-point resolution passed for State's all-round and all-inclusive development**

On its concluding day, the special session of Madhya Pradesh Vidhan Sabha unanimously passed a 70-point resolution presented by Chief Minister Shri Shivraj Singh Chouhan focusing on the state's all-round and all-inclusive development. The resolution was moved on May 11, the first day of the special session, which was convened with a view to getting suggestions based on grass root experiences of Vidhan Sabha members so that a roadmap can be prepared for golden Madhya Pradesh. During the last three days, as many as 87 members expressed their views on the resolution while 70 members presented their suggestions in writing since they could not speak during the session due to paucity of time.

The resolution passed unanimously by the Vidhan Sabha is as follows:

### **Vidhan Sabha Resolution**

This House is of the view that there should be such an all-round and all-inclusive development of the state through which the life of citizens can become rich and prosperous and they should have opportunities for putting in their best efforts according to their potential and contributing to the nation's development. For achieving these objectives, this House resolves that we will make agriculture profitable, constantly strengthen the infrastructure with extension of basic amenities, evolve a conducive atmosphere for investments, make available qualitative education and health services to all, ensure empowerment and of women, scheduled castes, scheduled tribes, backward classes, minorities and poor people of the general category and their active participation in the process of development, keep maintaining tight security and law & order situation and will run the state machinery as per laid down principles of good governance.

### **Points of Resolution**

'A'

1. Efforts should be made to increase state's growth rate from 9 to 10 per cent.
2. Necessary infrastructure including feeder separation should be developed for ensuring 24-hour power supply on single-phase and 8-hour supply for agricultural works.
3. Availability and quality of power should be improved and the rate of technical and commercial loss should be brought down to 9 per cent by the year 2013 so that power tariff can be decreased.
4. An increase of 5000 megawatts should be made in the established power generation capacity by the year 2013 with a view to improving power supply scenario in the state.

5. Arrangement of subsidies should be made for promoting generation of power through non-traditional sources of power and for their equipment as well as for conservation of power.
6. Divisional headquarters will be connected with four-lane roads and district headquarters with two-lane roads and all the villages will be linked with all-weather roads.
7. State Highway Fund should be evolved for the maintenance of selected highways.
8. Project Implementation Committees should be constituted for construction of government buildings.
9. City Development Plans should be prepared for planned development of all the cities.
10. An Infrastructure Board should be constituted for urban areas.
11. Fire brigade facility should be made available to every civic body.
12. Metro train feasibility survey should be conducted in Indore and Bhopal.
13. Mukhya Mantri Payjal Yojana should be started for solving drinking water problems in the rural areas.
14. Master Plan of every village should be prepared.
15. Panchayat Bhawan of every Gram Panchayat should be constructed in the next three years.
16. Established irrigation potential should be increased by 7.50 lakh hectares in the next four years.
17. All the effective efforts including Command Area Development Programme should be used for ensuring comprehensive utilization of irrigation potential.
18. A scheme should be chalked out for proper exploitation of water on scientific basis.
19. Soil Health Cards should be prepared for ensuring science-based agriculture.
20. The amounts of subsidy payable to farmers should be directly deposited in their bank accounts.
21. Area of horticulture crops should be increase by 5 lakh hectares in the next 3 years.
22. Madhya Pradesh should be developed as a logistic hub by increasing storage capacity and strengthening marketing system.
23. Marketing Federation Societies of the state should be strengthened.
24. Kisan Credit Cards should be provided to all the eligible farmers in the state.
25. Mobile Veterinary Clinics should be introduced in selected districts.
26. Apart from constituting Milk Committees, Milk Route should also be developed with a view to bringing about Milk Revolution in the state.
27. Like Kisan Credit Cards, fishermen should also be provided loans 3 per cent interest rate on Fishermen Credit Cards.
28. Wages of fishermen should be increased and new policy should be chalked out for rehabilitation of affected fishermen.

29. Tusser, lac and meadows should be developed with a view to increasing forest-based employment opportunities.
30. Works for conserving wildlife should be undertaken effectively.
31. Interests for farmers should be protected by total review of rehabilitation policy. Farmers' land should not be acquired at less than Rs 5 lakh per acre in the future schemes.
32. Quantum of Public-Private Partnership should be doubled up in the next 3 years.
33. A policy should be adopted for value augmentation of minerals in the state itself.
34. Planned development should be undertaken of Delhi-Mumbai, Bhopal-Indore, Bhopal-Bina, Jabalpur-Katni-Satna-Singrauli industrial corridor.
35. Arrangements should be made to ensure at least 50 per cent jobs to state's domiciles in the employment opportunities occurring in the industries being set up in Madhya Pradesh.
36. Job Fairs should be held in the state on regular basis.
37. A comprehensive social security programme should be chalked out.
38. Stamp duty exemption should be provided on the sale-deeds/pattas of EWS houses and plots allotted by the government authority.
39. English-medium Ashram Shalas should be introduced in all the tribal-dominant development blocks.
40. All the hostels of Tribal Welfare Department having less than 50 seats should be converted into 50-seater hostels.
41. Electricity/diesel pump sets should be made available to scheduled caste beneficiaries of Kapil Dhara Yojana.
42. During the next three years, 100-seater boys hostels for students of backward classes should be established in all the districts.
43. The amount under Mukhya Mantri Kanyadan Yojana should be increased to Rs 10 thousand.
44. Atal Bal Arogya Evam Poshan Mission should be established in the state.
45. Rajya Beemari Sahayata Nidhi and Deendayal Upchar Yojana should be extended.
46. Efforts should be undertaken to reduce the infant mortality rate from 72 to 50 per thousand and mother mortality rate from 335 to 225 per lakh by the year 2013.
47. Efforts should be made to bring Gross Production Rate to 2.6 per cent.
48. A high school should be established in the radius of every 5 kilometres as per requirement.
49. Efforts should be made for increasing the gross registration ratio in the higher education sector from 12.5 to 15 per cent.
50. ITI's should be upgraded and strengthened for imparting qualitative vocation training.
51. Conservation and development of local dialects including Bundeli, Malwi, Nimari, Bagheli, Baiga, Bhili, Korku, Gondhi etc. should be undertaken.

52. A state level Authority should be constituted for organising fairs and large-scale religious functions.
53. Sports facilities should be extended up to panchayat level.
54. Madhya Pradesh Sports Authority should be constituted.
55. Police strength should be increased in a phased manner and an India Reserve Battalion should be constituted.
56. A Suraksha Vahini comprising ex-servicemen should be constituted.
57. Effective action should be taken against illegal felling of forest trees, illegal mining, power pilferage, encroachment on government land and the names of ineligible persons should be deleted from BPL list.
58. Land Revenue Circular should be amended for immediate solution of revenue cases.
59. Pattas should be distributed among the rural populace.
60. District Cadre of Panchayat Secretaries should be established.
61. Mukhya Mantri Grameen Awas Mission should be started for solving housing problems in the rural areas.
62. Bar Coded Food Coupon Yojana should be launched for public distribution system.
63. Ration shops should be kept open on every working day.
64. Maximum VAT cases should be brought under the purview of self-assessment and the limit of composition should be raised up to Rs 60 lakh.
65. Maximum use of information technology should be made with a view to ensuring transparency, accountability and sensitive administration.
66. Integrated Fiscal Management Information System should be established.
67. The task of making recommendations for constant improvement in the state administrative services should be entrusted to Atal Bihari Vajpayee Public Administration Institute.
68. The system of carrot and stick for administrative staff should be made effective.
69. Citizens Charter should be implemented as an Act for guaranteeing provision of public utility services.
70. Appropriate changes should be made in the present system for ensuring transparency in the government purchases on proper prices.

It has also been proposed that this House make an appeal to the Union government to abolish futures trade in agriculture products, allot food grains according to actual number of BPL families in the state, provide funds under Indira Gandhi Awas Yojan as per the actual number of houseless people, provide quality coal in proportion to the requirements of state's thermal power plants, release CAMPA funds for the development of the state's forest areas, provide adequate financial resources for implementing Right to Education Act and give environment-related clearances for various development projects at the earliest.

**Building Certificates to be Given in villages, Atal Child Health Mission for Children  
Bus-Taxi Permits for Rural Areas  
Ban on Recruitment to be Lifted  
Appeals Centre for Cooperation for Development  
On the basis of MLAs' suggestions Chief Minister Shri Chouhan presents resolution for 'Golden Madhya Pradesh**

On the last day of special session of Madhya Pradesh Assembly today, Chief Minister Shivraj Singh Chouhan announced disposing of revenue cases within time limit; implementation of Chief Minister's tap water scheme in villages up to a population of 1000; construction of approach roads to agriculture land; separate unit for construction and maintenance of government buildings; giving of land record copy along with loan book to farmers; if necessary getting minimum Rs five lakh per acre of agriculture land; Rural Housing Mission, Separate Minister for welfare schemes of unorganized workers and poor, setting up of Mela Development Authority; Atal Child Health Mission for health of children and removing malnutrition; Janmitra Yojna for benefit of government employees in rural areas; Bus and taxi permits for better transport facilities in rural areas and giving of certificate for houses in rural areas.

Chief Minister Shri Chouhan announced above while presenting resolution to make the state Golden Madhya Pradesh on the basis of suggestions given by the members on the fourth and final day of special session of the Assembly today.

On this occasion Shri Chouhan said that development of Madhya Pradesh is our mission and even now we would like cooperation from the Opposition members for the same. He said that this special session of the Assembly is historical and special roadmap has been prepared for development of the state. We can make the state a Golden Madhya Pradesh only with cooperation of all.

The Chief Minister said a lot of work has been done for development during the last few years. He said that growth rate of the state in the year 2003 was 0.67 per cent which has gone up to 8.67 per cent in the year 2009. Our efforts would be to maintain minimum growth rate of 9 per cent, he said.

Shri Chouhan said that energy production is not with the state government only. Because of delay in sanctioning different projects by the Central Government, cost of project is bound to go up. This is an obstacle on the path of development. He appealed the Central Government not to play politics on the name of development.

He said that the thermal power stations in the state are receiving sub standard coal mixed stones. He said that several coal mines existed in the state and demanded the Central Government to supply coal from the coal mines located in the state to save from the burden of unnecessary transportation cost. He appealed the people to use electricity legally only.

During his address on the concluding day of the special Assembly session, Shri Chouhan threw light on the issues of injustice done by the Central Government towards the state. Against the number of 65 lakh families under below poverty line (BPL) the Central Government has taken it as 42 lakh families only and allotted food grains accordingly. This is injustice towards the poor families of the state. He said that since the Central Government is not supplying enough coal for the thermal plants in the state, production of electricity is adversely affected. Because of this, the state is forced to import coal on higher prices. He said that the state is preserving forests and the Central Government should provide Rs 8000 crore to continue preservation. He also demanded the Central Government to give Rs 5000 crore during the next three years to implement the Right to Education Act in the state. He said that the Central Government should complete the long pending rail projects in the state.

The Chief Minister said that provisions have been made for quarterly allocation of budget amount for proper use of funds. He said that the budget allocation would be given to the departments according to the progress of work plan. He asked all departments to prepare monthly, quarterly, and annual work plans for proper utilization of budget amount.

Shri Shivraj Singh Chouhan said that the Laghu Udyog Nigam will have no role in future for government purchases and alternative arrangements would be made for the same. This would encourage small scale industries, he said.

The Chief Minister said that with a view to effectively implementing Citizen Charter system, Public Services Guarantee Bill will be brought in the monsoon session of the Assembly. He said that his efforts would be to provide transparent and certified administrative system. He said that the public servants who do good work would be awarded. At the same time, corrupt and negligent officers would be punished too. He said that with a view to bring transparency in government payments, e-payment and cyber treasury system has been implemented.

Shri Chouhan said that to make agriculture a profitable business, the present system of giving bonus at the time of purchase of wheat and rice would continue. Agriculture loan is given at the rate of 3 per cent interest only. Cultivation of vegetables, fruits, flowers and medicinal plants would be encouraged to improve income of farmers. At the same time setting up of food processing units are being encouraged. For the purpose of storing food grains warehouses in large numbers would be constructed. Soil health card would be given to each farmer. Working of Mandis would be strengthened. Using of agriculture land for non-agriculture purposes would be discouraged, he said.

The Chief Minister said that 50 per cent employment in the industries being set up in the state would be ensured for the local citizens. Cattle rearing and dairy industry would be encouraged to ensure prosperity in villages

According to an estimate, Shri Chouhan said, the state can produce fish to the extent of Rs 10 thousand crores. The fishermen will be given loan at the rate of 3 per

cent interest. He said that Madhya Pradesh is comparatively a peaceful state. The listed dacoits have been wiped out from the state. Network of SIMI has been destroyed and naxlite activities are under control. The state government would continue its efforts to increase number of personnel in police force. At the same time Bharat Reserve Battalion with ex-servicemen would be constituted.

He said that the Central Government would be appealed to bring back the idol of Goddess Saraswati taken to England from the historical 'Bhojshala' situated in Dhar district.

The Chief Minister said that recruitment for government departments banned since last several years would be lifted to improve efficiency of working.

Shri Shivraj Singh Chouhan said that the MLAs had given very important suggestions. Action would be taken on the suggestions that are to be implemented soon. He said that the meeting to review development works in the Vidhan Sabha constituency would now be held in every two months instead of three months. He reiterated that prosperous and Golden Madhya Pradesh would be made only with cooperation of all.
